Twenty-six credits are required for graduation. These include state-mandated courses, as well as additional courses required by the school in particular disciplines. Trinity uses a semester system. All Trinity students in AP courses from 2017-2019 were required to sit for the AP exam. In 2020 and 2021, due to the pandemic, sitting for the AP exam was optional for all courses. Beginning in 2022, requirements of sitting for the exam varied by subject. Total students taking exams include sophomores, juniors, and seniors.

The AP Scholar designation is granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP exams. AP Scholar with Honors is awarded to students who receive an average score of 3.25 on all AP exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams. AP Scholar with Distinction is granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams. National AP Scholar is granted to students in the U.S. who receive an average score of at least 4 on all AP exams taken, and scored a 4 or higher on 8 or more of these exams.
